We have supported over 200,000 people in Iraq with medical supplies, shelter, psychological support, and more. AAF has helped rebuild communities affected by conflict and provided critical aid to hospitals across the country.

In 2020, AAF expanded internationally, launching its first mission in Yemen. Our food programmes there have been vital in addressing malnutrition, benefiting thousands of people. Today, AAF operates in Iraq, Yemen, and Ukraine.

Looking back, my journey from UKH to global humanitarian work was shaped by the skills and experiences I gained at university. UKH not only provided academic knowledge but also helped me discover my strengths and purpose. One valuable lesson was to always challenge my comfort zone and seize opportunities to make a difference.

As a UKH graduate, I encourage current students to embrace all the opportunities university offers. It's a time for self-discovery, personal growth, and developing the skills you need for the future.
